EXERCISE OUR CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY

If we don't research the options and then express our opinion at the polls then we shouldn't express our dissatisfaction with the results. I encourage all of us to be informed about the candidates and then go to the polls on November 4 and cast our ballot in favor of public education.

October 13 Board Meeting Report

All members were present. Action taken was on a 7-0 vote unless noted otherwise.

REPORTS

BOE – Delbert Armbrust reported on the KASB Fall Regional meeting he had attended.

SRO Flesher – His report included: the year has been going well and he has not had many major incidents to deal with; the new rules are working good; and a summary of the presentation and small group meetings at the MS/HS by Dale "Mad Dog" Messmer.

Mrs. Sprinkle – Her report included: the September 24 In-Service Day was spent working on test data from last year; the PTCs were very well attended; last year's MAP and State Assessment scores were shared with parents at the PTCs; in a random sample of PowerSchool connections approximately 25% of our families are accessing their child's information; Stan Slaughter of KSDE made a "Green Team" help the environment presentation; the carnival was a huge hit and was well attended with many MS/HS students running the games; and they have begun a monthly Round Table discussion group for 4th – 6th grade students that eat with Mrs. Songer and Mrs. Sprinkle and discuss various topics related to school procedures/rules.

Mr. Alexander – His report included: lot's of activities, both academic and athletic, taking place; 5 new students enrolled this month; the student body is working well together; the range of parents in grades 7-12 participating in the PTCs ranged from

50 – 80%; KSHSAA has changed the guidelines for coaches to work with students during the summer; we've been invited to participate in discussions about forming a new HS league; we successfully hosted the HOA Honors Choir on October 9; Olweus Bullying Prevention activities are going on; and shared a summary of this fall's MAP assessment results.

Mr. Minneman – His report included: a summary of the audit on last year's financial records; erecting the wind generator is now expected to not take place until November; and shared a list of meetings out-of-the-district he will be attending before the next meeting.

BUSINESS

Facilities — A motion was passed to continue discussions with the architect, bond counsel and financial advisor to work toward a bond election not to exceed \$7,200,000 on April 7, 2009.

Band Request — The board approved the HS band participating in a Worlds of Fun band festival this spring and for the Band Boosters organization to hold fundraisers to help pay the costs.

Board Policy Updates — Since this was the second reading of these proposals they were approved as presented.

Supplemental Position — Doug Wilson was approved as the 8th Grade Sponsor.

Capital Outlay Resolution — The current 5-year 4-mill resolution expires at the end of this year. A new 5-year 4-mill resolution was passed.

Secure Vehicle Bids — Invitations to bid will be sent to dealers for the following types of vehicles: a 65-passenger route Blue Bird or International bus; and a car.

KASB Convention Assembly Delegate — Delbert Armbrust volunteered to be the USD 307 delegate.

Out-of-District Student — Aspen Owen, 6th grade, was approved.

There were no Executive Sessions.

The meeting adjourned at 9:28 p.m.

Upon arrival, each school was greeted by a member of the Ell-Saline choir and directed to "their" section of the small gym. The men stayed in the west gym and worked with Greg Bontrager from Goessel and Amy Brandt from Ell-Saline while the girls went to the east gym to work with Berean Academy's choir director Carmen Goering. Ell-Saline's band and choir director Joan Grover worked with the various instrumentalists in the band room. In these sectionals, students worked on their parts for "Pilgrim's Hymn" which will be used as a KMEA audition piece and on a one gender piece—"Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy" for the girls and "Tell My Father" for the men.

After Mr. Chastain worked with both groups, they combined in the big gym to work on the rest of the program. This rehearsal lasted until 5:30 at which time everyone got a break from singing to eat supper, rehearse individual numbers, and change. Some schools took advantage of the sloppy joe supper offered by the high school band.

At around 6:45, everyone found their seats in the gym to start the concert. First, we heard specials from Remington, Ell-Saline, Moundridge, Goessel, and Berean Academy. After these were finished, the whole choir sang "Pilgrim's Hymn," "Gentle Annie," "Keep Your Lamps," and "Let Everything That Hath Breath." The men's and women's choirs performed their numbers.

SELECTING BOOKS FOR YOUR CHILD

Reading is the single most important skill your child will use in his/her lifetime. Selecting appropriate books now can bring and maintain an interest in reading for years to come.

Selecting books for your child can be a challenging and worthwhile task. Time and care must be taken when looking for that “right” book. The right book involves the child in positive experiences—suspense, humor, empathy, information, excitement, adventure, and enjoyment. Here are a few guidelines to follow:

1. The book should be honest.
2. A fiction book should be believable.

3. A nonfiction book should be accurate and free of complexities and technicalities. If the reader doesn’t understand the book, why read it?
4. If the book is just for fun, it should be lively, colorful, and humorous.
5. Books for the very young should have numerous exciting pictures.
6. Books for the older reader should relate to the child’s specific, particular interests.
7. No book should make fun of failure, ethnic groups, age, gender difference, or handicaps.

Here are a few suggestions of book titles that might be of interest to your child:

Preschoolers: Mother Goose, Ape in a Cape, Number of Things, Colors, and I am a Bunny.

Early school age children: Dr. Seuss, Where the Wild Things Are, The Snowy Day, Harriet the Spy, and Morris the Cat.

Older Children: The Hobbit, A Wrinkle in Time, The Cat Ate My Gymsuit, Encyclopedia Brown, and Kate Alone.

These are only suggestions. Our school librarian will be able to help you with selecting other books.

Books can open new worlds for your child. Make reading an important pastime in your home!

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

Welcome to November from Ell-Saline USD 307. Wow! It doesn't seem possible that it can be that time of year already. In just a few more weeks we'll be sitting around our dining room tables with family and friends, eating a delicious turkey dinner with all the trimmings, and giving thanks for the many blessings that we receive.

This past month I have been reminded of, and have observed, many things going on with our students, staff and patrons that give us cause for celebration. On October 1 at the Salina Country Club, four of our top senior students and their parents were recognized at the KU Honors Banquet. They were: Casey Gorrell, son of Karen & Dave; Josh Kejr, son of Geena & Joe; and Morgan Lindsay, daughter of Cindy & Brian. Our high school vocal students were part of the HOA

League Honor Choir that we hosted on October 9. Not only were they part of the large choir but also showcased our local talent by performing one number by ourselves. Various FFA teams placed well at competitions they were in and a group of them attended the National FFA Conference in Indianapolis. The MS volleyball and football teams completed their seasons after giving us plenty to cheer about and showing improvement during the season. The HS volleyball and football teams have competed well throughout the season and the football team has qualified for the playoffs. Mr. Mohn has several students working hard in preparation for the upcoming play, *Urning It*. Ms. Grover and her instrumental students showcased their talents by performing at the home HS football games. All of our students in Grades 3 – 11 have completed the MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) assessment. Our elementary students ran a marathon. A group of high school students participated in the HOA Leadership Conference at HCC on October 22. Our MS/HS students and staff worked on a successful 1-day activity on using statistical data. Numerous educational field trips have been taken to enhance our students learning. We recently finished our first 9-weeks grading period and looking at the grade reports of the students, even amidst all of the activities going on, our students and staff "kept their noses close to the grindstone" to begin the year. The District Calendar Committee has met to begin looking at possibilities for next year's calendar. Our CPTA and Booster clubs continue to provide additional support for our students and staff. Several district patrons and Board of Education members have given of their time by serving on the Cardinal Foundation for Educational Excellence Board of Directors as they met to determine the awarding of various grant funds.

In last month's ECHO I reported that as a district and individual buildings we had met the AYP (Adequate Yearly Progress) goals on the 2007-2008 state assessments but we hadn't yet heard how the individual classes did. We have now learned the scores of the individual classes and they are as good as we had expected! Our students made the *Standard of Excellence* on many of them. At the elementary school all grades tested (Grades 3, 4, 5, 6), as well as Building Wide, made the *Standard of Excellence* in Reading. Grades 3 and 6, as well as Building Wide, made it in Math. At the MS/HS all grades tested (Grades 7, 8, 11) as well as Building Wide made it in Reading. In Math Grade 11 and in History/Government Grade 8 made it. The hard work of the students, staff and parents and of the board in providing resources again paid dividends. With that success, however, we still can't just sit still and not continue to find ways to improve. The No Child Left

Behind target in 2014 is still that 100% of every student in the country scores at that level. Therefore, our staff continues to attend workshops on methods and strategies, to have conversations with each other as to what works and what doesn't, to implement new programs for remediation and enrichment for our students, and our parents continue to encourage their students to work hard. With all of those things taking place, we will continue to improve.

It is refreshing to see the interest, and involvement, of so many parents and patrons of the district. Only through your help and encouragement will Ell-Saline USD 307 continue to be a place where your children will receive a quality education. Thank you for your continued trust and confidence.

CARDINAL FOUNDATION FOR EDUCATIONAL EXCELLENCE GRANTS AWARDED

At it's meeting on Wednesday, October 22, the Cardinal Foundation Board of Directors awarded 4 grants totaling \$2,691.45 that will help support both classroom and school-wide efforts. This year the staff submitted 10 grant applications with a total value of \$7,556.18 for the Cardinal Board to select from. The funding for these grants is made possible through the investments of the Foundation.

The 4 grants are (rounded figures):

\$780 – Elementary School Olweus Bullying Prevention Team for banners and posters displaying the program rules.

\$675 – Elementary School Olweus Bullying Prevention Team for banners and posters displaying the program rules.

\$800 – Jeremy Miller, Joe Roche and Chris Carazo for the purchase of GPS devices for us in MS and HS classes.

\$436 – Dale Dodd to fund start up costs for an IHT class project of operating a school store.

The Cardinal Foundation for Educational Excellence was founded to provide opportunities for patrons and parents to fund innovative programs, creative teaching methods, and general improvements that enhance the learning environment for every Ell-Saline School District student. Grants are awarded annually based on applications submitted by teachers. The amount of the funding is determined by the interest earned on the endowment funds and on 10% of any new funds endowed during the year. The Cardinal Foundation is a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation so

gifts from individuals and businesses can generate tax benefits (federal and state income, estate, etc.) for the donor. The Foundation accepts donations throughout the year. FACILITIES IMPROVEMENT UPDATE

At it's meeting on Monday, October 13, the Board of Education went on record of continuing to move forward with some major improvements to our facilities at both the elementary and middle/high school sites. The intent is to have this placed as a ballot question on the April 7 election in an amount not to exceed \$7,200,000. The current estimates are below this amount but as with all things the more time goes by the more costly everything is. These improvements include both remodeling and additional space. At the elementary school it includes: adding 7 classrooms and reconfiguring 7 current classrooms to meet other needs; adding a multi-purpose/gymnasium area; adding restrooms; enlarging the office area to include a room for the nurse, counselor and conferences; adding additional parking space; and relocating some of the playground items. At the middle/high school it includes: adding a commons area; remodeling of existing space to include moving the office complex, counselor, special education, SRO, custodial, weight room and nurse; enlarging the existing locker rooms and rest rooms by the gymnasium to include a weight room; enlarging the shop building; relocating the district office. At the present time everything is still in the conceptual stage with no definite drawings being completed. More of this process will take place within the next two months.

The board again expressed it's appreciation to the Site-Council/Patron Facilities Committee for their work and time in identifying facilities needs and solutions of the district.
