## REPORTS

Bal-A-Vis-X - Mrs. Minneman and three $6^{\text {th }}$ Grade students (Conner Anglin, Ty Chalmers, Trenton Parks) demonstrated some of the Bal-A-Vis-X exercises that they use on a daily basis and then taught them to board members.

Mrs. Sprinkle - Her report included: she will be attending the KSDE Fall Conference/KAESP Conference in November; a Preschool Research Team has been formed and they are gathering information regarding the support for a preschool program; a team of administrators and teachers will be visiting schools to gather information on setting up our iPad carts and strategies for using them; additional grants are being applied for to purchase additional iPads and carts; and the Parent Math Enrichment Night is October 24.

Boys' Golf Request-Julie Weems, Tyler Weems and Tanier Clifford requested approval for a boys' golf team beginning this spring. More information was requested by the board and this item will be on the November agenda for action.

Library Aide Position-The Library Aide position was moved from the Clerical Aide pay scale to the Classroom Aide/ Paraprofessional pay scale.

Accept Vehicle Bids-Bids were approved on one (1) used 2012 65 -passenger Blue Bird bus from Kansas Truck; two (2) 2014 Dodge Caravan mini vans from Marshall Automotive Group and one (1) Ford E150 full size van from Long McArthur Ford. (We have since been notified that the used 2012 Blue Bird was no longer available.) The two mini vans the district currently owns are being traded in and the old white full size van will be up for bid.

Capital Outlay Resolution-A 5-year 8-mill resolution starting next year was adopted. The current levy expires this year. The district has not levied any mills for Capital Outlay for the past two years but without a resolution we would not have the authority to do so if the need arises.

Approve New Hire-Heather Hall was approved as our new District Office Administrative Assistant.

6. Teen killers who use guns during the crimes obtain those weapons from parents or close relatives most of the time, and only about $50 \%$ of teen killers use guns in the commission of their crimes.
7. There is no PROFILE of a teen killer or school shooter. They are White, Black, Asian, Hispanic, Rich, Poor, Educated, Uneducated, Popular, Loners, Religious, and Atheist.
8. $80 \%$ or more of SCHOOL KILLERS plan on dying during the shooting, either self-inflicted, or death by cop.
9. The most common reason for a school massacre is revenge on those who have wronged the killer, along with instant fame and recognition.
10. Juvenile homicides and school shootings have taken place in Catholic Schools, Public Schools, Private Schools, Urban Schools, and Suburban Schools.
11. The most deadly hour of the school day is the first period, or first hour. Other dangerous times include times when students are gathered in large numbers-think lunch, school assemblies, sporting events.
12. Two things you must do to keep your STUDENTS SAFE is hire an SRO at the school, and ELIMINATE BULLYING completely with ZERO TOLERANCE.
13. Teen killers and school shooters will fall into a TRANCE-LIKE state when killing, and may not know what they are doing, or may not hear you telling them to drop the weapon.
14. A juvenile homicide and a school massacre can take place in any school, in any county, in any state, and in any country. The biggest mistake we can make is to think that IT WON’T HAPPEN HERE!
15. Most of these juvenile killers have NO HISTORY OF VIOLENCE.

## COMMON CORE CORNER

## Kansas College and Career Ready

This month's corner will be devoted to dispelling some of the myths that continue to circulate about Common Core. Next month the corner will be devoted to looking at samples of the actual Common Core Standards.

## Myth: No teachers were involved in writing the Standards.

Fact: The common core state standards drafting process relied on teachers and standards experts from across the country. In addition, there were many state experts that came together to create the most thoughtful and transparent process of standard setting. This was only made possible by many states working together.

## Myth: The Standards are not research or evidence based.

Fact: The Standards have made careful use of a large and growing body of evidence. The evidence base includes scholarly research; surveys on what skills are required of students entering college and workforce training programs; assessment data identifying college-and-career-ready performance; and comparisons to standards from high performing states and nations.

In English language arts, the Standards build on the firm foundation of the NAEP frameworks in Reading and Writing, which draw on extensive scholarly research and evidence. In Mathematics, the Standards draw on conclusions from TIMSS and other studies of high-performing countries that the traditional US mathematics curriculum must become substantially more coherent and focused in order to improve student achievement, addressing the problem of a curriculum that is "a mile wide and an inch deep."

## Myth: The Standards tell teachers what to teach.

Fact: The best understanding of what works in the classroom comes from the teachers who are in them. That's why these standards will establish what students need to learn, but they will not dictate how teachers should teach. Instead, schools and teachers will decide how best to help students reach the standards.

## Myth: The Standards will be implemented through No Child Left Behind (NCLB) - signifying that the federal government will be leading them.

Fact: The Common Core State Standards Initiative is a state-led effort that is not part of No Child Left Behind and adoption of the Standards is in no way mandatory. States began the work to create clear, consistent standards before the Recovery Act or the Elementary and Secondary Education Act blueprint were released because this work is being driven by the needs of the states, not the federal government. The NGA Center and CCSSO are offering support by developing a State Policymaker Guide to Implementation, facilitating opportunities for collaboration among organizations working on implementation, planning the future governance structure of the standards and convening the publishing community to ensure that high quality materials aligned with the standards are created.

## Myth: These Standards amount to a national curriculum for our schools.

Fact: The Standards are not a curriculum. They are a clear set of shared goals and expectations for what knowledge and skills will help our students succeed. Local teachers, principals, superintendents and others will decide how the standards are to be met. Teachers will continue to devise lesson plans and tailor instruction to the individual needs of the students in their classrooms.

In just a few short weeks we’ll be sitting around our dining room tables with family and friends, eating a delicious turkey dinner with all the trimmings, and giving thanks for the many blessings that we receive.

This past month I have been reminded of, and have observed, many things going on with our students, staff and patrons that give us cause for celebration and thanksgiving. Every year the University of Kansas recognizes the top $10 \%$ of seniors from high schools in the state. The HS volleyball, cross country and football teams have competed well throughout the season and volleyball and cross country have qualified for post season competition. Ms. Brandt and Ms. Grover are working with their students in preparation of the Grades 5-6 music concert on November 14, the HOA Instrumental Honors Concert at Remington High School on November 12 and the Grades 7-12 music concert on November 25. Our HS Scholars’ Bowl team coached by Mrs. Hanson has begun its competition. Our students in various grade levels have completed the MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) assessment.
