Raising Readers: Tips for Parents 3-2-1 Strategy

Strategies to Support Comprehension

Comprehension is the purpose for reading. To support comprehension development at-home, teachers can share the 3-2-1 and Read, Cover, Remember, Retell strategies with parents. The 3-2-1 strategy can also be used to discuss a television program, movie, or unit of study at school. For example, a parent could say, "Let's do 3-2-1 for your Social Studies unit at school. What are 3 things you discovered from this unit? What are 2 things you found interesting? What is 1 question you still have?" This strategy builds comprehension and provides an opportunity to review content. Parents can easily implement this strategy while helping their children with homework involving reading textbooks, studying for tests, and even at the dinner table as they reflect on the school day.

Read, Cover, Remember, Retell Strategy

READ only as much as your hand can cover.

COVER the words with your hand.

REMEMBER what you have just read. (It is okay to take another look).

RETELL what you just read inside your head or to a partner.

When parents start to use the Read, Cover, Remember, Retell strategy with their children, they can apply it consistently as they work through a piece of text, paragraph-by-paragraph. With more practice, children can retell the information in their own heads which will support their comprehension development.

Ways for Parents to Encourage Reading

The following are some ways to turn a young reader's reluctance into enthusiasm:

1. Scout for things your children might like to read. Use their interests and hobbies as starting points.
2. Leave all sorts of reading materials including books, magazines, and colorful catalogs in conspicuous places around your home.
3. Notice what attracts your children's attention, even if they only look at the pictures. Then build on that interest; read a short selection aloud, or simply bring home more information on the same subject.
4. Let your children see you reading for pleasure in your spare time.
5. Take your children to the library regularly. Explore the children's section together. Ask a librarian to suggest books and magazines your children might enjoy.
6. Present reading as an activity with a purpose; a way to gather useful information for, say, making paper airplanes, identifying a doll or stamp in your child's collection, or planning a family trip.
7. Encourage older children to read to their younger brothers and sisters. Older children enjoy showing off their skills to an admiring audience.
8. Play games that are reading-related. Check your closet for spelling games played with letter tiles or dice, or board games that require players to read spaces, cards, and directions.
9. Perhaps over dinner, while you're running errands, or in another informal setting, share your reactions to things you read, and encourage your children to do likewise.
10. Set aside a regular time for reading in your family, independent of schoolwork, the 20 minutes before lights out, just after dinner, or whatever fits into your household schedule. As little as 10 minutes of free reading a day can help improve your child's skills and habits.

85th Kansas FFA Convention Recognizes Member Achievements.

Manhattan, Kan. - One of the largest annual gatherings of Kansas high school students concluded Friday as more than 2,000 FFA members, agricultural educators and supporters closed the final session of the 85th Kansas FFA Convention. This event was held on the campus of Kansas State University in Manhattan.

The convention theme, "Grow," inspired members' growth as future leaders in agriculture, their communities and the world. The theme also reflects the many opportunities FFA offers students to develop their potential through Career Development Event (CDE), Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) programs and more.

Convention guests heard from the retiring 2012-2013 state FFA officer team and motivational speakers Mark Black and Harriet Turk, as well as K-State linebacker Tre Walker and Greg Peterson of the popular Peterson Farm Brothers YouTube song parodies.

Forty members were awarded proficiency awards for accomplishing specific career goals in their SAE programs. The State FFA degree, the highest honor a state association can bestow, was awarded to 236 members. Three of those recipients were recognized for having the best SAE programs in the state. Star in Agribusiness honors were awarded to Bryan Otott of the Washington County FFA Chapter; Star in Agricultural Placement was awarded to Rich Ryckert from the Paola FFA Chapter; and Star Farmer was presented to Zachary Foster of the Labette County FFA Chapter.

"The Kansas FFA Convention continued the 85-year tradition of developing students' potential in premier leadership, personal growth and career success," said Emily Beneda, Kansas FFA president and member of the Wilson FFA Chapter. "We proudly celebrated the work and achievements of Kansas FFA members and future leaders of the agriculture industry."

Flyte, the National FFA mascot, made a special appearance throughout the convention. Attendees also were entertained by 69 members performing in the Kansas FFA Band and Choir, as well as a laser light show before each session, sponsored by the K-State College of Agriculture.

In addition to individual recognition, entire FFA chapters were recognized through National Chapter Awards and the Triple Crown Award. The coveted Triple Crown distinguishes the top state chapter in the areas of student, chapter and community development and was awarded to the Chapman FFA Chapter.

During the final session, six extraordinary members were elected to serve as the 2013-2014 state FFA officer team. Lindy Bilberry, Garden City FFA, was elected President of the Association. Other team members are Vice President Carrie Carlson, Centre FFA; Secretary Chance Hunley, Riverton FFA; Treasurer Cody Holliday, Jackson Heights FFA; Reporter Daryl Simmons, Minneapolis FFA; and Sentinel Elizabeth Allen, Holton FFA.



FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

Greetings and Welcome to the 2013-2014 school year at EII-Saline USD 307. Another summer has come to a close and a new school year has opened up. This year we went back to only a partial week to start with and everyone seemed to hold up well and the year has started very smoothly in each building.

Every year brings new beginnings with the accompanying excitement and apprehension. The excitement stems from: having several new staff members sharing either their prior experiences or fresh out of college ideas; our second year of All-Day Kindergarten; knowing that the staff has attended workshops and classes over the summer to improve instruction; having students and staff around again; the buses being all shined up after a year of road grime; and new students and families to our district with us. The apprehension stems from: have all of the materials/supplies that were ordered come in; is all of the technology working as it is supposed to be; do we have enough desks for everyone; do we have everyone on a bus route that is supposed to be; is the air conditioning working; with all of the increased traffic on the roads is everyone being extra careful; how are our new staff and students adapting and are we helping them to feel welcome. Sadly, as the year goes by we normally get caught up in the daily routines and we tend to lose the "excitement" that comes with the beginning of the year. On the other hand, we normally discover that our apprehensions were all taken care of and that it has been another good beginning of a new school year. This year again has been no different. We appear to be off to a GREAT start!

Our student enrollment looks like it is going to be very close to what it was last year but only the number of students with us on September 20 will count toward state funding. At last count we are up by one student over last year. As has been the case for the last few years, one of the pieces of information that I think tells a great deal about the education our students receive, and the reputation that EII-Saline USD 307 has, is in the large number of out-of-district students that apply to attend with us. At the August board meeting, 20 new out-of-district students were approved and many more potential students were not even brought to the board for approval because our class sizes are already at capacity. We could have opened a third section of All-Day Kindergarten with the number of potential students that we had to turn away. This number of new out-of-district students is lower than in past years but that is not because of a lower number wanting to come. It's because this year we have 30 in-district kindergarten students so we only had room for a very low number of out-of-district students. Overall, just over 43% of our students are from out-of-district. Word continues to get out about the many good things we do here for students.

Again this year we have a few new staff members that will help us to do even better. District wide we have 18 teachers, administrators, sponsors and classified staff members that are either new to the district or are in a new role this year. New at the elementary school are: Kim Parks, 1st Grade; Katie Swank, Title I; Megan Loder, Full-Time Title Reading Teaching Assistant; Mindy Schneider, Part-time Title Math Para and Lunch/Recess Aide; Anita Bird, secretary; and Mary Plott is a Student Teacher in Mary Ellen Muninger's 4th Grade classroom. New at the MS/HS are: Julie Glenn, upper level Math; Amanda Little, upper level English and Drama/Forensics Sponsor; Jeff Westover, Social Science, MS Ass't. Football and Boys' Basketball Coach; Jim Proseus, Full-time Math Para; Danielle White, Part-time IDL Spanish Para; Kris Bell and Darcy Bradley, MS Cheerleader Co-Sponsors; Nikki Davenport, HS Cheerleader and Dance Sponsor; Brian Morris, Head MS Football and Boys' Basketball Coach; Norm Jennings, Asst. MS Football Coach; Brandon Toll, Asst. HS Football Coach; and Jeff Vogt, Head HS Girls' Basketball Coach. Jerry Hammonds is our new School Resource Officer (SRO). Lynn Davis will be our new Board Clerk when Susan Rose retires November 1. Michelle Cooper and Mitch Drees are our two new Board of Education members. We welcome each of these individuals and look forward to many good years of working together.

A challenge every year is in building a budget that provides us with the resources necessary to continue to provide the opportunities that help our students be successful. We also balance that with being mindful of not placing too much additional tax burden on our patrons. Again this year I feel that we have been able to meet both of those criteria. Unfortunately the legislature did not approve any increase in the Base State Aid Per Pupil (BSAPP), last year was the second, and final, year of our New Facilities Weighting and our district valuation went down slightly (\$45,000). We do anticipate an increase in both the number of students enrolled and in the number of students qualifying for Free Lunches both of which will help offset the loss of the New Facilities Weighting dollars. As a result of the accumulation of each of those just mentioned pieces of the budget, the mill levy for this year's budget did increase slightly (1.121 mills). We are appreciative of the support our patrons continue to give us and we strive to be good stewards of your tax dollars.

Thank you for your continued trust and confidence in the EII-Saline USD 307 school district. You can be assured that your children are receiving a quality education. Please call or stop in so we can visit about the good things going on in your district.

SCHOOL MESSENGER SYSTEM
