### SORTING OUT THE BUDGET NUMBERS

Every year at the beginning of the budget hearing when we are starting to review the Notice of Public Hearing form, the board and everyone Marty Kramer was the only board member absent. All action was ap- who is in attendance is cautioned to remember that the first two columns of numbers represent what we actual spent in the previous two years and that the last column is what is budgeted to be spent for the current year. The reason for the caution is that if the last column was looked at as representing the same thing as the first two, then it would appear that we were going to be spending a lot more money in the current year. But that would not be comparing apples-to-apples.

> Because of some changes in the funding mechanism and how funds come to districts from the state this year, it is even more critical than usual to remember the differences in what the columns represent. At first look it appears that we will have about \$1.3M more dollars in our budget than we had last year going from \$8.9M to \$10.2M. Here is where the numbers get confusing and need to get sorted out. Is it real-

> The answer is, it is not. It is simply the legislature manipulating the way in which payments are made to schools so that it looks like the state is contributing more money as the Governor and some legislators

> Starting last year the local 20-mill tax levy from local property taxes was no longer sent directly to local school districts. Instead, the 20-mill levy is sent to Topeka and deposited in the state treasury. In turn it is makes it appear that it did.

> fund now pays out funding for KPERS (Kansas Public Employee Retirement System) for the district's teachers and other employees and counts that as school funding. It goes directly into the General Fund and within minutes it is automatically withdrawn from the district's bank or be used for any local expenses. What is the purpose of this change? > A third change this year concerns Capital Outlay. State aid for Capital Outlay used to be deposited into the Capital Outlay fund. Not this year. It also, now is deposited into the General Fund and then locally this change? Did the state provide more aid? No, it simply makes it appear that it did.

> WOW!! The Governor can claim that Ell-Saline USD 307 receives more state aid this year. But not so fast. That supposed increase is only in the way state aid now comes to us so the Governor and some legislators can twist the numbers to make them say what they need for them to say. When our amount of state aid for KPERS, LOB and Capital Outlay are added together it amounts to \$1,160,208. When the increased amount of \$104,170 for Virtual Fund is added in then the new amount to be transferred from the General Fund is \$1,345,444. After those transfers we actually have less General Fund dollars than we had last year.


### Phonemic Awareness:


Comprehension:

### FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

Greetings and Welcome to the 2015-2016 school year at Ell-Saline USD 307. Another summer has come to a close and a new school year has opened up. Again this year we had only a partial week to start the year and everyone seemed to hold up well. The cooler than normal weather has also been a help. The year has started very smoothly in each building.

Each year the district selects a motto to help keep all of us focused and moving in the same direction. This year's district motto was selected because we, again, have a number of challenges ahead of us that only by working together will we be able to overcome them and do what is best for our students. To name a few: this year there is an increased emphasis on technology at both buildings which will take some individuals out of their comfort zone; there is continued work with the new assessments and getting scores from last year that will help guide us in our teaching; all staff members will have been through the new evaluation system at least once; there is a large increase in the health insurance premiums that will put more pressure on our budget; there is the loss of several general education, special education and classified positions that in turn puts more responsibilities on all of us; there is the perception by some students that they have been bullied and as a result some have left the district and we have to overcome that perception. To be successful in meeting these challenges it will take all of us (teachers, secretaries, administrators, cooks, custodians, bus drivers, paras, board members, parents and patrons) pulling together! All of this led to selecting this year's Ell-Saline USD 307 district motto of "Cardinal Team: Pulling Together for All Students!"

Every year brings new beginnings with the accompanying excitement and apprehension. The excitement stems from: having several new staff members sharing either their prior experiences or fresh out of college ideas; knowing that the staff has attended workshops and classes over the summer to improve instruction; having students and staff around again; the buses being all shined up after a year of road grime; and new students and families to our district with us. The apprehension stems from: having all of the materials/supplies that were ordered come in; is all of the technology working as it is supposed to be; do we have enough desks for everyone; do we have everyone on a bus route that is supposed to be; is the air conditioning working; with all of the increased traffic on the roads is everyone being extra careful; how are our new staff and students adapting and are we helping them to feel welcome. Sadly, as the year goes by we normally get caught up in the daily routines and we tend to lose the "excitement" that comes with the beginning of the year. On the other hand, we normally discover that our apprehensions were all taken care of and that it has been another good beginning of a new school year. This year again has been no different. We appear to be off to a GREAT start!

This year's enrollment is almost identical to last year which is the lowest it has been after several years of enrollment increases. As of now we have 461 students. As has been the case for the last few years, one of the pieces of information that I think tells a great deal about the education our students receive, and the reputation that Ell-Saline USD 307 has, is in the large number of out-of-district students that apply to attend with us. At the August board meeting, 31 new out-of-district students were approved and many more potential students were not even brought to the board for approval because our class sizes are already at capacity. Again this year between 40 and 45% of our students are from out-of-district. When that many students are attending here by family choice rather than simply by living here, it is apparent that word continues to get out about the many great things we do here for students.

Again this year we have a few new staff members that will help us to do even better. District wide we have 6 teachers, sponsors and classified staff members that are either new to the district or are in a new role this year. New at the elementary school are: Meghan Norris who was a Full-Time Title Reading Teaching Assistant last year is now a 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Teacher; Seth Lamborn, who was a substitute teacher last year is a Full-Time Title Reading Teaching Assistant; Dalton Eastep, Special Education para; New at the MS/HS are: Amanda Murray, English Student Teacher under Amanda Little; and Erin Hecker, Asst. HS Volleyball Coach. We welcome each of these individuals and look forward to many good years of working together. You might recognize one of those names as a recent Ell-Saline graduate.

A challenge every year is in building a budget that provides us with the resources necessary to continue to provide the opportunities that help our students be successful. We also balance that with being mindful of not placing too much additional tax burden on our patrons. Again this year I feel that we have been able to meet both of those criteria. This year school funding is not based on the formula that had been in place since 1992 which factored in the number of students and various weightings but has been changed to a Block Grant system under which schools receive the same amount of funding as they received last year regardless of the number of students enrolled or their needs. So the number of students we have this year isn't as critical as it has been in the past but we still want to maintain our level of student enrollment. A positive for us this year is that our Assessed Valuation went up by a considerable amount, nearly \$3.5M. Part of that increase was in Saline County but the vast majority was in Ellsworth County and is a result of the pipeline that was laid last year. For the second year in a row we have been able to lower our mill levy. This year it decreased by .613 mills over what was budgeted last year! We are appreciative of the support our patrons continue to give us as we strive to be good stewards of your tax dollars. The same as the last few years, I again have some concerns with our budget as we move through the year. The concerns, again, are with things that are out of our control. The main one is in the millions of dollars less than is projected that continue to be received in tax collections by the state. The concern is that with the loss of state revenue, during the year there will be a cut in the Block Grant as has happened in past years when the state was short on money. Once we are into the year, it is difficult to make any adjustments as our budgets are very tight to begin with. Will we receive the full amount on time or will the check be held up because the state has had to use the money to fulfill other obligations? I know that we all hear Governor Brownback and legislative leaders say that the state is on the right path to economic growth but so far the revenue coming in to the state is not proving that to be correct.

Thank you for your continued trust and confidence in the Ell-Saline USD 307 school district. You can be assured that your children are receiving a quality education. Please call or stop in so we can visit about the good things going on in your district.

### MORE ACCOLADES FOR OUR DISTRICT

Last year Ell-Saline was noted as being one of the best districts in Kansas for students to get a quality education. Several factors are included in arriving at the ranking including: Average teacher salary; Overall teacher experience; Administration and policies; Health and Safety; Resources and Facilities; Student:Teacher ratio; Teacher absenteeism; Teachers in 1<sup>st</sup>/2<sup>nd</sup> year; and Academics.
