### March 21 Board Meeting Report

Jeff Parker was the only board members absent. All action was approved on a 6-0 vote unless noted otherwise.

#### V. REPORTS

Parents as Teachers (PAT) – Christy Mai reported on her efforts in Topeka in support of PAT and needed funding. For next year there are new financial guidelines for families that will make it harder for them to qualify to participate. Also, the funding has been shifted to Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) from the Children's Initiative Fund (CIF) which reduces the amount of funds.

BOE – Jamie Bradley reported that the Save the Date cards have been mailed out for the Cardinal Foundation Fundraiser that will be held on June 4 at the C&W Ranch.

Mrs. Sprinkle – Her report included: state assessments have started; March 24 In-Service Day activities; upcoming efforts to involve parents in contacting legislators regarding concerns with proposed legislation; a school climate activity for staff on March 23; and the handling of a student issue on March 11.

Mrs. Wildeman – Her report included: several seniors have received scholarships; the majority of our seniors have completed the Regents recommended curriculum; hosting of a Forensics meet and Sub-state Basketball Tournament games on March 3 and both went smoothly; and the hosting of an external review team from May 4-6 to conclude the school improvement cycle.

Mr. Minneman – His report included: bond refunding update; legislative updates; reviewed the progress on perception surveys that will soon be available for students, parents, staff and patrons as part of the district accreditation process; and dates that he will be attending meetings out of the district before the next meeting.

#### VII. BUSINESS

- A. MS Wrestling Request—Norm Jennings made a request to begin MS Wrestling next year. No action was taken. This will be brought back at the April meeting for possible action.
- B. Touchdown Club Presentation—Steve Davenport presented information on the Touchdown Club (football booster club) and fundraising efforts that they are planning.
- C. Approve Student Out-of-State Travel Requests The following requests were approved: Business Professionals of America (BPA) to Boston from May 5-9; Senior trip to Houston from May 7-11; and Duncan Anglin to compete in the National Forensics Meet in Sacramento from May 26-30. Each of these trips is funded by the students, grants, donations and fundraisers.
- D. Principals' Contracts—Mrs. Sprinkle's contract was extended through the 2017-2018 school year. This keeps her on a 2-year contract. The amount will be set following the completion of negotiations.
- E. Board Policy  $-2^{nd}$  Reading—The proposed policy changes were approved as presented.

There were three Executive Sessions (Personnel -2, Negotiations).

The meeting adjourned at 9:12 p.m.

#### FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

As I sit here with just a few days of March left, it appears that it is going to go out like a lamb rather than a lion! The wheat fields are looking really good, a few lawn mowers have been heard, trees are leafing out, and everyday more flowers are bringing color to the world. Spring is definitely upon us. Something we could use, though, is much needed moisture to keep things going!

Spring time in school district offices is normally one of the most anxious times of the school year because of the uncertainty of what legislation will be passed that will impact them. This year has been no different in the number of proposed bills that would have had an anti-public education result if passed. Fortunately, only a very few of them either made it out of committee or were approved by both chambers. The probability of anything that hasn't yet been approved to move forward is unlikely because the legislature adjourned on Friday, March 25, until it reconvenes on April27 for the veto session. However, it's important to remember that just because no action has yet been taken on a bill, if it has been sent to an exempt committee it is still alive not just for this year but for the years ahead as well. Below is a short list of the major education bills that were passed and now await the Governor's signature.

- S Sub for HB 2655-School Finance: This bill is the legislatures attempt to satisfy the Supreme Court's ruling on the equity issue. It is a compromise of an earlier Senate and House bill and is the funding formula for next school year which basically provides all districts with the same total dollars as this year's budget. Even if the Governor signs it, it will still have to be approved by the Supreme Court or the legislature will need to go back to work and develop a new formula.
- <u>SB 168 KPERS-Working After Retirement</u>: This bill will allow school employees that have already retired and have gone back to work to continue working until the year 2020 without having any earnings limit. This will have a positive impact on three of our employees.
- <u>SB 367 -Juvenile Justice</u>: This bill requires school administrators and School Resource Officers to be trained (unfunded mandate) in responding effectively to misconduct in school while minimizing student exposure to the juvenile justice system
- <u>SB 469 Professional Negotiations</u>: This bill requires that in every third year the teachers vote to determine who will be the bargaining unit that represents them in negotiations.
- <u>Sub for SB 323 Suicide Prevention:</u> This bill requires staff to receive suicide prevention training (unfunded mandate) annually.

Below is a list of bills or issues that were either defeated, never made it out of committee or never became a bill but yet created a great deal of anxiety for school districts. It is still important to remember that when the legislature returns on April27, or even in next year's session, these could all come back up-and some of them are very likely to.

- <u>Sub for Sub for HB 2292-Common Core</u>: This bill would have prohibited the teaching of any material that was related to the Common Core standards.
- <u>HB 2729 -School Procurement:</u> This bill would have required districts to purchase certain types of goods or service through the state Office of Administration rather than using their local or current vendors.
- <u>District Realignment/Consolidation</u>: This would have required all schools districts in counties that have less than 10,000 students to consolidate into one district. This would have meant that USD 307 Ell-Saline would no longer have existed but rather would have been part of USD 305 Salina.
- Ending Balances: This would have allowed the state to use as partial state aid, the carryover balances that school districts maintain for these times when state funding has been flat or decreasing, for making payroll or other expenditures when the state is late in making its monthly state aid payments to schools, for making planned purchases, etc. In other words it would be like you having to spend your savings accounts so that you had nothing left for emergencies.
- <u>Insurance Pooling</u>: This would have required the state to develop health insurance and property insurance pools which every school district would have had to participate in.
- <u>Private School Tax Credits</u>: This would have allowed individual taxpayers as well as corporations to receive tax credits toward scholarships for students to attend private schools. This would have greatly reduced the amount of revenue coming in to the state at a time when the state is already struggling financially.

• <u>Sex Education</u>: This would have required that parents "opt in" their children to receive sex education rather than the current "opt out" of receiving it.

For your convenience, contact information for our area legislators is again listed. If you would like more specific information on how any of the above mentioned bills might impact us, please let me know and I'll get it to you. For the future of our district, it continues to be important for our voices to be heard.

Spring time in school buildings is one of the most rewarding times of the school year. This year is already proving to be no different. This is the time of year when the culmination of one year's, or several years', worth of effort and accomplishment is recognized. In many activities our students have continued to represent themselves and our school in a very positive manner. Our middle school recently competed in the Heart of America League music festival where the hard work of the 16 entries was rewarded by earning 13 ratings of I and 3 ratings of II! The MS Quiz Bowl teams have competed well in the contests that they have participated in. Fourteen of our Business Professionals of America students qualified for the national competition to be held in early May in Boston. The Forensics students continue to compete well in their tournaments and Duncan Anglin has qualified for the National Competition to be held in late May in Sacramento. We have large numbers of students participating in our spring sports of both middle school and high school track as well as high school softball, baseball and golf. As the seniors look forward to next year and pursuing their goals, various scholarships have been announced, with more to come that will help them in their endeavors. We ended our 3<sup>rd</sup> 9-weeks grading period just before Spring Break and looking at the Honor Roll it appears that even with all of the activities that the students have been involved in, they continue to do a GREAT job in the classroom!

Spring time in school districts is also normally a stressful time as that is when our students take the Kansas State Assessment tests that give us information on progress they have made over the year and helps us make decisions for the future. Both buildings have begun administering them and I'm happy to report that so far this year there have been very few technology glitches and the testing has gone smoothly! When we receive the scores they will provide feedback on our continued implementation of the new standards. Our staff continues to use quality teaching techniques and covering of content. We ask that you continue to encourage your children to do their best, get adequate sleep and eat a nutritious breakfast during these testing days.

This year the Kansas Department of Education (KSDE) has requested that each district help with the scoring of the Multidisciplinary Performance Tasks (MDPTs) on the English Language Arts (ELA) portion of the state assessments. During the morning of our March 25 In-Service Day, our entire staff participated in this by scoring those assessments of students from other districts across the state. Part of the time was spent in training for the scoring and in reviewing examples of scoring that had been done by outside experts. It was very educational for our staff to see not only what is expected by the experts but also how our students' writing compares to that of students in other districts. The consensus of the staff that I worked with and visited with later is that our students seem to match up very well.

Thank you for your continued trust and confidence in the Ell-Saline USD 307 school district. You can be assured that your children are receiving a quality education. Please call or stop in so we can visit about the many good things going on in your district.
